### **Braybrook**





Gem Class enjoyed a visit to Flag Fen Archaeology Park in November to explore how prehistoric people of the fen lived over 3000 years ago. They have been learning all about the Stone, Bronze and Iron Ages in their Imaginative Learning Project and this was a great opportunity to wander through a Bronze Age village, sit within roundhouses and stand where our ancestors once stood, all very close to home! The children got to make their own pottery to take home. It really helped Year 3 to consolidate their learning and bring it to life!

In the Times Table Rock Stars 'England Rocks' annual competition, Year 6 finished 7th out of 83,097 classes!

Children were talking strategies in the dinner queue, teachers

were geeing children up on the playground and children were entering daily both at home and at school. As a school, our average score per child placed us 9th out of 3,793 schools! Shu Wei in Year 6 finished an amazing 39th out of 778,137 children across

England. We are so proud of all the children who took part. We hope that Year 6 and especially Shu Wei will be something to aspire to for next year's competition!





Our Year One and Year Two classes had a virtual visit from the Geo Bus. Amy the Scientist was able to talk each class through 3D images of the solar system, Mars, rocks, volcanoes and craters. They really loved wearing the special 3D glasses! Children learnt a lot about space during the session and particularly the planet Mars, including why it is red. They got to ask Amy plenty of questions at the end of the session and many of them left wanting to become an astronaut!

#### **Glebelands**

What a busy term we have had here at Glebelands! It was great to have everyone back after a lovely summer, and the children returned full of energy and enthusiasm to get going. We spent the first few weeks of September focusing on poetry, giving children a chance to find their feet in their new classes and show what they were capable of. Presentation is a key focus for us this year and so we began the year as we meant to go on. The children selected poems to write up and illustrate. The children produced some beautiful pieces of work and it has been pleasing to see this high standard continue throughout the term. The school

really has been a hive of activity.





It has been great to be able to welcome visitors, go out for trips and explore our local area again - it is clear that these experiences really help children to learn more about the topic and remember it! We have been able to have some exciting and immersive learning experiences. Stone Age Day was the most recent of these, with the children in year 3 spending the day outside taking part in all things stone age.

We could not let Christmas pass us by without sharing in the festivities and so found a way to continue to share Christmas performances virtually allowing the wider audience to capture these special moments. We hope that everyone will have a wonderful Christmas and we are sure that the children will return in January ready for another jam-packed term!

#### Gorefield

We have had a busy term - all our classes have settled in well and have been renamed after a famous scientist. We now have Goodall, Eva Garrett Anderson and Lovelace classes, and the children are able to tell each other all about their scientist. Garrett Anderson class had a wonderful science lesson where they explored the workings, feel, and smell of real organs – livers, hearts, lungs etc. There were a few squeamish moments! We

have newly appointed librarians who work during break time to ensure the books are neatly ordered, and can recommend books too. Each class now has a vibrant display where children record the book they are currently enjoying.

For Remembrance, Year 6 made a wreath and took it to the war cemetery next to the school. They read a famous poem called In Flanders Fields, and found a number of names of relatives of children who are currently at our school.



Our football team represented the school at the POSH competition in Peterborough and loved getting back to doing what we love - we all did our best and had fun. Commando Matt has been coming every week to work with our Year 5 and 6 children - we are looking forward to cooking s'mores on our campfire this week.



a fascinating experience and allowed them to experience in real life what we've been learning about in the classroom this term.

Our school took part in our local community Christmas Tree Festival where our KPA/GS choir did a wonderful job singing to

the community. We even won first place in our category with our decorated Christmas tree: "Our wishes for the future"!



What a busy term we have had at Leverington – lots of exciting things going on and many challenges too!

In November, the whole school spent a week of their Maths lessons taking part in a variety of activities to inspire and engage the pupils with Maths around them: we learnt times tables, Maths around a story, nature and the outdoors, maths in art and maths in the real world.

We were delighted to be able to take our School Council representatives this year to observe a 2-minute silence at the village war memorial on Remembrance Day. They heard the names of those who had lost their lives fighting for their country in the war, and how these family names are still in Leverington today. All children also contributed a piece of poppy art to create our whole school Remembrance display.

We inspired a love of writing this term through our 'Villains Day', where both children and staff enjoyed dressing up as their favourite villain from a story and taking part in

a range of writing activities based around the theme, with amazing writing being produced throughout school. We



also had a 'Poetry Day' where all classes chose their favourite rhyme or poem which they learnt by heart, performed and then wrote their own versions, from 'The Wise Old Owl' to 'On the Ning Nang Nong'.

The whole school took part in a sponsored Rudolph Run to raise money for the Alan Hudson Day Treatment Centre in Wisbech, who provide support for people living with life-limiting illnesses. The children really enjoyed running 10 laps of the school field with the charity mascot, Arthur Bear, and we were so proud to raise an incredible £2336 for this wonderful charity!

#### Middlefield

It's been a fantastic term at MPA! We raised nearly £1000 with our Readathon. It was lovely seeing the children reading in different areas all around the school – the staffroom was a firm favourite place to read! Our wonderful PTA have supported in many ways this term with improvements to the school. They funded a new peaceful play area designed by last year's year 6 children, who came back to school for the grand opening of the area. The area is now used at break times for reading and playing board games.



The PTA also funded a new mural for the school walls. Following a design competition, a child's design was chosen

from each class and artist Tim Shucker-Yates did his own interpretation of the winning designs. It makes such a difference and the children absolutely love it!

Year 6 had an unforgettable day out watching the ballet 'Giselle' at the Royal Opera House. It was an amazing experience, and we were proud that members of the public commented on the wonderful behaviour and attitudes of the children.



Parents wanted more music in school according to a recent parent survey — so that is what we gave them! The Rock Steady Music crew joined us in

October. All the children and staff dressed up as rock stars, and the whole school enjoyed a day of learning what it's like to be a part of a rock band. Tommy from RSMC was incredible! We had 50 children sign up to the programme after the event. Every week, these children are taught how to play different instruments and learn how to be a part of a band. It's had a huge impact on self-esteem and confidence building!

#### Murrow

We have had busy term at Murrow. The children settled well and have been loving learning about Explorers, Kings and Queens and the ancient Egyptians. Pippin has been in school a lot and has shown us all how fast she can run; we have also been able to read to her. Our new reading club is now happening every Friday. A group of children get to read a high-quality text and discuss it with Ms Cunningham. Our early morning wake-up club has about forty children attending every day - this is when we all get a chance to warm up, meet our friends and get ready to learn.

Our younger children have loved working in our woodland area - making bird feeders, wind chimes, taking part in the RSPB Bird watch and much more besides.

We took part in the 11th November Remembrance Day ceremony in the village and two of our children laid a wreath on Remembrance Sunday.



Our Lego League Competition team entered the annual Lego League challenge. As well as designing a solution to reduce the carbon footprint of large delivery vans, they also designed a robot to compete in the robot challenge. Our team came second overall in the robot part of the competitions which was an amazing feat.

Our Early Years Foundation classes were very excited to have visits from both the police and fire station staff. A fire engine arrived on site and the children were able to look at it. 

We were overwhelmed by the response to our harvest collection for the March foodbank. The school council decided to support the March foodbank as it benefits a number of families in the area.




